A WORLD RECORD FOR THE OTIP PROGRAM

(We surpassed our own expectations.)

In 2012 during the Oceania Championships held in Apia Samoa, Dr Tamas Ajan, President of the IWF launched the first **OTIP program** (**Oceania Talent Identification Program**) organized by the Oceania Weightlifting Federation. The aim was to reach, by the end of the fifth year - 5,000 student entries.

This year, the seventh year of this program, those expectations have been surpassed by far. We have reached a staggering 11,165 entries coming from 14 countries and from 101 schools. (That is 6,002 boys and 5,163 girls) We have achieved these astonishing figures with the full assistance of the IWF supported by ONOC and this year also by the Eleiko Company.

The results of this year could not have been achieved without the support of the 14 countries/federations who took part in the program. In particular, this year, a special thanks must go to Jerry Wallwork from Samoa, David Katoatau from Kiribati and Jenly Wini from the Solomon Islands. These three individuals have contributed enormously, to this year's record breaking numbers.

What a great program the OTIP has turned out to be. This OWF school initiative has been the backbone of the development of champions in the Oceania region in recent years. This program organised by the OWF, is financially supported by the International Weightlifting Federation. Special thanks must go to Dr. Tamas Ajan, President of the IWF, for his support and enthusiasm towards the program.

This is a unique program in the world of weightlifting. It was implemented specifically to identify talented students throughout the schools of the Oceania region, and in particular the Pacific Island nations.

What is truly amazing, is that in a short period of time, the national federations have been able to tap in on the work that they have done at the school level, producing the next generation of champion weightlifters. These are some of the students who were identified through the OTIP program by their own federations and are now lifting in national and international events including the Commonwealth Games and the Olympic Games.
