PACIFIC MINI GAMES AND 2025 OCEANIA WEIGHTLIFTING CHAMPIONSHIPS

It was not easy, but in the end, we did it. The Pacific Mini Games and Oceania Senior Championships held in Palau on July 1st to 5th, despite all of the challenges which we faced, turned out to be a great event.

The OWF encountered many challenges. The areas which caused enormous stress and uncertainty was the airline tickets for the ITO's which at the end the OWF had to pay for and supported also by the Pacific Games Council. The OWF also had to look after the internal transport for our referees as well as ensuring that they had proper meals at the end of each long day. The OWF also set up the VIP room with all the necessary items (with the exception of water) in order to provide suitable refreshments for all of our hard working technical officials and also serving any VIP guests. Transport was also covered by the OWF to transfer the technical officials at the end of the championships to the airport. And as if this was not enough, we also needed to source loaders from the different countries who took part – for every single session.

Despite all of this, and with the assistance of the competition manager Dean Terry and his team, the event turned out to be a great success. Many VIP guests from the different countries attended the championships. We were delighted to have almost every single day, the attendance of the President – Mr. Vidya Lakhan and the CEO- Mr. Andrew Minogue of the Pacific Games Council. In the 88kg category, the President of the Republic of Palau, Surangel Whipps Jr, attended and also in the +110kg category on the last day and session we had the honour of having IOC member and President of ONOC, Baklai Temengil.



Many Oceania, Commonwealth and Pacific records were established during the four days of competition. In addition, there was a world record attempt made by young Fijian superstar Nehemiah Elder, but unfortunately it was not successful. This was the first ever world record attempt at Mini and Pacific Games.

The competition venue was filled to capacity for each session.

Special thanks must go to Trent Dabwido who was the MC for the full four days, keeping the crowd enthusiastic right throughout. Also, to the CEO of Australian Weightlifting, Ian Moir together with Simon Francazio who brought in 150kg of technical equipment required to run the event and kept it operational for the entire time. In addition, a special thanks to the hard-working technical officials who made sure that the whole event ran smoothly and on time. All in all, the competition turned out to be very exciting, with world class performances on display.

Dika Toua in Palau set a record that very few athletes have achieved in any sports. She won her first Oceania Title in 2002 in Suva lifting at 53kg category Totalling 130kg.

In 1997 at the Pago Pago Pacific Mini Games, Nauru dominated the Gold Medal tally not only in weightlifting but in all sports by winning 33 gold medals. At that time every Pacific country leader wanted to take out the three medals for weightlifting and leave only one, irrespective of the fact that we were following the IWF rules. Paul Wallwork at that time, President of the OWF and Paul Coffa General Secretary of the OWF, fought to retain the three medals for each category. Stating that the sport would be growing immensely in the Pacific Islands and in the future all countries would be sharing in the medals. How right these two people were. They could see the future. Look at the results in Palau. Eight countries won gold medals with fourteen countries winning medals. In Tahiti the medals will be distributed even further.
